"Migrants and the Pickle Industry: How Seasonal Mexican Farmworkers Reshaped the Upper Midwest Heartland, 1964-1994"

What happened to migrant labor in the Midwest after the Bracero Program? The central contention of this dissertation examines that question and analyzes how Latino migrant labor continues to sustain pickling in the upper Midwest long after the braceros. Despite some legislative victories and moderate success settling migrants out of the stream, poor farm labor conditions persist into the late 20th century. This work examines migrant labor experience in the pickle industry in Wisconsin and Michigan.
